Executive Summary

This Demographics Report, which was prepared for the U.S. Department of Defense (DoD), presents a synthesis of demographic information describing members and families in the military community in fiscal year 2019. Active Duty Service branches include DoD's Army, Navy, Marine Corps, and Air Force; and the Reserve components include DoD's Army National Guard, Army Reserve, Navy Reserve, Marine Corps Reserve, Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve, and Department of Homeland Security's (DHS) Coast Guard Reserve.

Overview of Military Personnel

The total number of military personnel is over 3.5 million strong, including DoD Active Duty military personnel (1,326,200); DHS's Coast Guard Active Duty members (40,830); DoD Ready Reserve and DHS Coast Guard Reserve members (1,038,198); members of the Retired Reserve (199,756) and Standby Reserve (8,385); and DoD Appropriated and Non-Appropriated Funds civilian personnel (896,160). DoD's Active Duty and DHS's Coast Guard Active Duty members comprise the largest portion of the military force (39.0%), followed by Ready Reserve members (29.6%) and DoD civilian personnel (25.5%).

Active Duty Member Highlights

Service Branches. The Army has the largest number of Active Duty members (479,785) followed by the Navy (332,528), the Air Force (327,878), and the Marine Corps (186,009). At a total of 1,326,200 DoD Active Duty members, the military force of 2019 is 6.9 percent smaller than it was in 2010, when there were 1,417,370 Active Duty members. From 2010 to 2019, the Army (-17.1%), Marine Corps (-8.9%), and Air Force (-0.5%) all experienced a decrease in the number of members. The Navy (+2.8%) experienced an increase compared to 2010.

Ratio of Ranks. The DoD Active Duty force is composed of 82.4 percent enlisted personnel (1,093,011) and 17.6 percent officers (233,189). Overall, the Active Duty force has 4.7 enlisted personnel for every one officer. In comparison, the Army has one officer for every 4.2 enlisted personnel, the Air Force has one officer for every 4.1 enlisted personnel, the Navy has one officer for every 5.0 enlisted personnel, and the Marine Corps has one officer for every 7.7 enlisted personnel.

Gender. The DoD Active Duty force has 224,760 women (16.9%), while 1,101,440 men comprise 83.1 percent of the DoD Active Duty force. Compared to 2010, both the percentage of Active Duty enlisted members (from 14.1% in 2010 to 16.6% in 2019) and the percentage of Active Duty officers (from 15.7% in 2010 to 18.4% in 2019) who are women has increased. Overall, the ratio of female enlisted members (181,771) to female officers (42,989) is 4.2 female enlisted members for every one female officer, while the ratio of male enlisted members (911,240) to male officers (190,200) is 4.8 male enlisted members for every one male officer.

Race/Ethnicity. Approximately one-third (31.2%) or 413,764 of Active Duty members identify themselves with a racial minority group (i.e., Black or African American, Asian, American Indian or Alaska Native, Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, Multi-racial, or Other/Unknown). The percentage of Active Duty members who identify themselves as a racial minority has increased from 2010 (31.4% of enlisted members and 22.7% of officers) to 2019 (32.8% of enlisted members and 23.9% of officers). From 2015 to 2019, the percentage of enlisted members who identify themselves with a racial minority group decreased (from 33.2% to 32.8%) while the percentage of officers increased (from 22.8% to 23.9%). overall ratio of racial minority enlisted personnel (358,148) to racial minority officers (55,616) is 6.4 enlisted personnel for every one officer. To conform to the latest Office of Management and Budget (OMB) directives, Hispanic is not considered a minority race designation and only Active Duty members' race was used to determine racial minority status. Regarding ethnicity, 16.7 percent of Active Duty members identify themselves as being of Hispanic or Latino ethnicity.

Geographic Location. While the Active Duty population is located throughout the world, the three primary areas in which Active Duty members are assigned to are the United States and its territories (87.4%), East Asia (6.5%), and Europe (5.0%). Ten states (California (157,226), Virginia (124,894), Texas (120,924), North Carolina (100,602), Georgia (69,368), Florida (60,218), Washington (58,448), Hawaii (40,761), South Carolina (39,451), and Colorado (35,821)) comprise 69.9 percent of the personnel stationed in the United States.

Age. Nearly half (45.7%) of Active Duty enlisted personnel are 25 years of age or younger, with the next largest age group being 26 to 30 years (21.2%). The smallest group were those 41 years or older (7.8%). Almost one-quarter (23.3%) of Active Duty officers are 41 years of age or older, with the next largest age group being 26 to 30 years (23.2%). The smallest group were those 25 years or younger (14.5%). Overall, the average age of the Active Duty force is 28.2 years. The average age for Active Duty enlisted personnel is 26.9 years, and the average age for Active Duty officers is 34.4 years.

Education Level. Most enlisted members (80.3%) have a high school diploma and/or some college experience, while fewer have a Bachelor's degree or higher (8.7%). The majority of Officer's (86.3%) have a Bachelor's degree or higher. Compared to 2010, the percentage of total Active Duty members who have a Bachelor's and/or an advanced degree increased for enlisted personnel (from 4.9% in 2010 to 8.7% in 2019) and officers (from 82.7% in 2010, to 86.3% in 2019).

Marital Status. Just over half (50.7%) of Active Duty military members are married, which is lower than the percentage that were married in 2010 (56.4%). In 2019, almost half (47.2%) of enlisted members and a majority (67.0%) of officers report themselves as married. In addition, 6.8 percent of DoD's Active Duty members are in dual-military marriages.² During the 2019 fiscal year, 3.5 percent of enlisted personnel and 1.7 percent of officers are estimated to have divorced. The estimated number of divorces among active duty members has decreased overall from 2010 (3.6%) to 2019 (3.1%). However, divorces for enlisted members has increased from 2010 (3.4%) to 2019 (3.5%) whereas divorces for officers has decreased from 2010 (1.9%) to 2019 (1.7%).

Reserve and Guard (Selected Reserve) Member Highlights

Reserve Components. The Ready Reserve comprises the Selected Reserve, the Individual Ready Reserve, and the Inactive National Guard. Because Selected Reserve members train throughout the year and participate annually in Active Duty training exercises, this report primarily focuses on the Selected Reserve, unless otherwise specified. The Selected Reserve Force consists of 807,602 members in seven components. The Army National Guard (335,973) and Army Reserve (190,719) have the largest number of Selected Reserve members, followed by the Air National Guard (107,197), the Air Force Reserve (69,389), the Navy Reserve (59,658), the Marine Corps Reserve (38,389), and the DHS's Coast Guard Reserve (6,277). Similar to the Active Duty force, the overall number of members in the Selected Reserve is lower in 2019 compared to 2010. The Selected Reserve force is 6.1 percent smaller than it was in 2010 (when there were 857,261 Selected Reserve members).

Ratio of Ranks. The Selected Reserve is composed of 83.5 percent enlisted personnel (673,946) and 16.5 percent officers (133,656). Overall, there are 5.0 enlisted personnel for every one officer in the Selected Reserve. This ratio varies across the Selected Reserve, with the Navy Reserve having 3.2 enlisted personnel for every one officer, the Air Force Reserve having 3.9 enlisted personnel for every one officer, the Army Reserve having 4.0 enlisted personnel for every one officer, the Coast Guard Reserve having 5.2 enlisted personnel for every one officer, the Army National Guard having 6.3 enlisted personnel for every one officer, and the Marine Corps Reserve having 7.5 enlisted personnel for every one officer.

Gender. Women (166,386) comprise 20.6 percent of the Selected Reserve force, while men (641,214) comprise 79.4 percent of the Selected Reserve force. The percentage of women in the Selected Reserve has increased since 2010 from 17.8% of enlisted members and 18.2% of officers to 20.7% of enlisted members and 19.9% of officers in 2019. Overall, the ratio of female enlisted members (139,780) to female officers (26,606) is 5.3 female enlisted members for every one female officer, and the ratio of male enlisted members (534,164) to male officers (107,050) is 5.0 male enlisted members for every one male officer.

Race/Ethnicity. Approximately one-quarter (26.4%) of the Selected Reserve members identify themselves with a racial minority group (i.e., Black or African American, Asian, American Indian or Alaska Native, Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, Multi-racial, or Other/Unknown). The Selected Reserve is composed of 185,524 enlisted personnel identifying with a racial minority group and 28,048 officers identifying with a racial minority group, with 6.6 enlisted personnel for every one officer identifying with a racial minority group. The overall racial minority representation in the Selected Reserve has increased in the past ten years for both enlisted personnel (from 24.9% in 2010 to 27.5% in 2019) and for officers (from 18.9% in 2010 to 21.0% in 2019). To conform to the latest Office of Management and Budget (OMB) directives, Hispanic is not considered a minority race designation and only Active Duty members' race was used to determine racial minority status. Regarding ethnicity, 13.5 percent of Selected Reserve members identify themselves as being of Hispanic or Latino ethnicity.

Geographic Location. The majority (99.3%) of the Selected Reserve is located throughout the United States and its territories. Ten states (California (57,121), Texas (55,166), Florida (37,341), Pennsylvania (29,417), New York (28,978), Ohio (28,337), Georgia (27,908), Virginia (26,216), Illinois (24,585), and North Carolina (21,340)) comprise 42.8 percent of the personnel stationed in the United States.

Age. More than one-third (38.3%) of Selected Reserve enlisted members are 25 years of age or younger, with the next largest age group being 26 to 30 years (20.2%). Those 36 to 40 years of age (11.5%) were the smallest age group. Over two-fifths (41.7%) of Selected Reserve officers are 41 years of age or older, with the next largest age group being 36 to 40 years (22.1%). The smallest age group were those 25 years or younger (5.3%). Overall, the average age of the Selected Reserve is 31.7 years. The average age for Selected Reserve enlisted personnel is 30.2 years, and the average age for Selected Reserve officers is 39.2 years.

Education Level. Most enlisted members (75.0%) have a high school diploma and/or some college experience and 12.0 percent have a Bachelor's degree or higher. The majority (88.9%) of Selected Reserve officers have a Bachelor's degree or higher. Since 2010, the percentage of Selected Reserve members who have a Bachelor's degree or higher has increased for both enlisted personnel (from 8.0% in 2010 to 12.0% in 2019) and officers (from 84.5% in 2010 to 88.9 % in 2019).

Marital Status. Less than half (43.7%) of Selected Reserve members are married, compared to 48.2 percent who were married in 2010. In 2019, 38.7 percent of Selected Reserve enlisted personnel and 68.8 percent of Selected Reserve officers report themselves as married. In addition, 2.7 percent of the Selected Reserve report that they are in a dual-military marriage. During the 2019 fiscal year, 3.1 percent of Selected Reserve enlisted personnel and 1.8 percent of Selected Reserve officers are estimated to have divorced.

Overview of Military Families

Across the Active Duty and Selected Reserve population, there are 2,127,525 military personnel and 2,619,788 family members, including spouses, children, and adult dependents. Of the military personnel, 46.1 percent are single with no children, 32.2 percent are married with children, 15.7 percent are married without children, and 5.9 percent are single with children. Approximately half (48.1%) of military personnel are married. Of the 965,113 military spouses, nearly one-quarter (22.6%) of spouses are 26 to 30 years, while 22.2 percent are 31 to 35 years, 19.4 percent are 41 years or older, 18.8 percent are 25 years or younger, and 17.0 percent are 36 to 40 years. Of the 1,644,456 total military children in 2019, the largest percentage are between birth and 5 years of age (37.8%), followed by 6 to 11 years of age (32.0%), and 12 to 18 years of age (23.7%), and fewer children are between 19 and 22 years of age (6.4%).

Active Duty Family Highlights

There are fewer DoD Active Duty members (1,326,200) than their associated family members (1,591,042). Nearly one-third of the members (32.5%) of the Active Duty force are married with children and 4.0 percent are single parents. The largest group of children is between birth and 5 years (42.1%). The next largest groups are between the ages of 6 and 11 years (32.1%), between 12 and 18 years of age (21.8%), and between 19 and 22 years of age (4.0%). There are 8,135 adult dependents 23 years and older among the families of Active Duty members.

Reserve and Guard (Selected Reserve) Family Highlights

There are fewer DoD and DHS Selected Reserve members (807,602) than their associated family members (1,039,786). Of the 807,602 Selected Reserve members, 31.8 percent are married with children and 9.1 percent are single parents. The largest group of children is between the ages of 6 and 11 years (31.9%), followed by children between birth and 5 years (31.6%), between 12 and 18 years (26.6%), and between the ages of 19 and 22 years (9.8%). In addition, there are 1,509 adult dependents 23 years and older claimed as dependents by Selected Reserve members.

The 2019 Report

To provide a holistic profile of the military community, the 2019 Report presents demographic information for Active Duty and Reserve and Guard personnel. The data contained in this publication were derived from a variety of sources and, in general, only data that are available on a consistent basis for all Services are presented. The majority of data are managed by the Defense Manpower Data Center, particularly the Active Duty Military Personnel Master File, the Active Duty Military Family File, the Reserve Components Common Personnel Data System, and the Reserve Components Family File.

All exhibits included in this report contain source citations, and the Data Sources and References section of this document provides a reference for all data sources.

Guidelines for Interpreting Data

Guiding principles for interpreting data include:

- Numbers for population groups (e.g., Active Duty, enlisted members) may vary across exhibits as a result of different data sources, missing data, and/or rounding.
- Percentages may not total to 100 due to rounding or missing data.
- Warrant officers are included with officers unless otherwise noted.

In the Active Duty sections of this report, data are presented for the four DoD Service branches (Army, Navy, Marine Corps, and Air Force). Some information about the DHS's Active Duty Coast Guard is presented in the Total Military Force section of this report. In the Reserve and Guard Members section, the label "Total DoD" is used to reflect the six Reserve components under DoD (Army National Guard,

Army Reserve, Navy Reserve, Marine Corps Reserve, Air National Guard, and Air Force Reserve), while "Total Selected Reserve" includes DHS's Coast Guard Reserve data in addition to data from the DoD Reserve components.

The data pertaining to Reserve and Guard members depict the Selected Reserve and the National Guard and do not include any other Ready Reserve forces (i.e., Individual Ready Reserve and Inactive National Guard) unless otherwise specified. The introduction to Section 3 describes the composition of the Reserve forces of the United States and explains why most data displays are limited to Selected Reserve personnel.

All data pertaining to Active Duty and Selected Reserve family members (i.e., spouses, children, and adult dependents) are extracted from the Defense Enrollment and Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS). Therefore, the data are dependent on the military members reporting the necessary information.



Total Military Force

1.01 ■ Military Personnel and DoD Civilians (N=3,509,529)

This pie chart presents the total number of Active Duty and Reserve and Guard members from all branches of the DoD and the DHS Coast Guard, as well as the civilian personnel who support the DoD. Overall, the total military force and civilian personnel comprises 3,509,529 people. DoD's Active Duty members make up 37.8 percent of the total military force. Data for all DoD Active Duty members are presented in Section 2.

All Reserve and Guard manpower is assigned to one of three Reserve Component categories: the Ready Reserve, the Standby Reserve, or the Retired Reserve. The Ready Reserve makes up 29.6 percent of the total military force. The Ready Reserve comprises the Selected Reserve, the Individual Ready Reserve, and the Inactive National Guard. Because Selected Reserve members train throughout the year and participate annually in Active Duty training exercises, they are the primary focus of the Reserve sections of this report. DHS's Coast Guard Reserve members are frequently activated by the U.S. Navy; therefore, their data are included with Selected Reserve data in this report. Data for all Selected Reserve members are presented in Section 3.



Active Duty, Reserve, and Guard members of the Army make up the largest percentage of military personnel (45.7%), followed by Active Duty, Reserve, and Guard members of the Air Force (22.2%), the Navy (18.1%), the Marine Corps (12.0%), and the Coast Guard (2.0%).



DoD Civilian Personnel

DoD civilians are divided into two primary categories. Appropriated Funds (APF) civilian employees are funded by congressional appropriations. Non-Appropriated Funds (NAF) civilian employees are not funded by congressional appropriations, but are funded by revenue-generating activities.

1.03 ■ DoD Appropriated Funds (APF) Civilians (N=778,708)

There are 778,708 APF civilian personnel who constitute 22.2 percent of the total DoD workforce. Of all the DoD APF civilians, the largest percentage are employed by the Army (33.5%), followed by the Navy (26.2%). The Marine Corps (2.4%) employs the smallest percentage of APF civilians.



There are 117,452 NAF civilians who constitute 3.3 percent of the total DoD workforce. Of all DoD NAF civilians, the largest percentage are working for the Navy (26.1%), followed by the Army & Air Force Exchange Service (AAFES; 24.8%). Other DoD areas (0.8%) employ the smallest percentage of NAF Civilians.









































2.41 ■ Age of Active Duty Enlisted Members (N=1,093,011)

































































3.45 ■ Age of Selected Reserve Enlisted Members (N=673,946)























































































6.35 ■ Number of Male and Female Children of Selected Reserve Members by Child Age and Member Pay Grade: High School and Above


